DR KADIATU KANNEH-MASON

Dr. Kadiatu Kanneh-Mason lives in Nottingham and is a former lecturer in English at The University of Birmingham.

She has recently published her memoir, House of Music: Raising the Kanneh-Masons for which, in November 2021, she won the Royal Philharmonic Society's Storytelling Award. They described it as 'a fresh, moving account of raising children and nurturing their creativity. It captures what's sincerely human in classical music-making.'

Kadiatu has seven children, all of whom are classical musicians and the family has been the subject of several documentaries. She is on the Board of Trustees for ESTA String Teachers Association, The Nottingham Education Trust, Real Talk TV, Music Masters, the National Children's Orchestra and MISST — the Andrew Lloyd-Webber charity for music in secondary schools.

Kadiatu is continuing to write and frequently delivers talks, interviews and lectures around the U.K. on diversity in classical music, music education, issues of race and inclusion, literature and parenting.

KRIS HALPIN

Kris Halpin aka Dyskinetic is a Disabled artist and educator, and a leading figure in the drive for musical inclusion. Known internationally for his pioneering work repurposing Imogen Heap's groundbreaking MiMu Glove technology, Kris has performed live to tens of thousands of people throughout the UK, Europe the US and Japan. In 2017 his highly praised live show, The Gloves Are On, was a finalist in Lottery The National Awards for Best Arts Proiect. Apart from his artistic work as Dyskinetic, Kris also leads the Dyskinetic: Inclusion Strategy - a wider strategic drive to improve representation of Disabled people in the music industry. Dyskinetic IS has partnered with high profile clients such as Apple, Ableton and Spotify to improve Disability Representation, and Kris regularly consults to the UK and US Music Industries in partnership with Independent Venue Community. As part of the education strand of Dyskinetic IS, Kris works closely with music services at both national and international level to help educators empower the next generation of Disabled musicians.
